#### 1. Introduction

The resignations of two members of the House of Assembly, Progressive Conservative member Richard Hurlburt effective February 9, 2010 and Liberal member Dave Wilson effective March 12, 2010, representing the electoral districts of Yarmouth and Glace Bay respectively', created two vacancies in the Nova Scotia House of Assembly.

On Thursday, May 20, 2010, pursuant to an Order-in-Council of the Lieutenant Governor in Council, a writ of election was issued by the Chief Electoral Officer to the returning officer for Glace Bay, John Shaw and to the returning officer for Yarmouth, Marie Atkinson, ordering that elections be held in both electoral districts on June 22, 2010. The Chief Electoral Officer published an election calendar, a copy of which is shown in Appendix A. The election calendar counts downward from May 20 or day 33, the day the writ was issued to July 22 or day minus 10, the earliest date for the return of the writ after election day. The calendar also identifies key filing dates for official agents. For example, day minus 30 for filing the reconciliation of tax receipts and the return of unused receipts to the returning officer, and day minus 70 for filing the Audited Report of Candidate's Election Expenses directly with Elections Nova Scotia.

At the time of the May 20, 2010 by-election calls the distribution of seats by recognized parties in the Nova Scotia House of Assembly was: 31 members from the Nova Scotia New Democratic Party; 11 from the Nova Scotia Liberal Party; 7 from The Progressive Conservative Association of Nova Scotia; 1 independent member and 2 vacancies.

Nomination day for both by-elections was June 8, 2010. In Yarmouth, six candidates stood for election, one each from the Green Party of Nova Scotia (GPNS), the Nova Scotia Liberal Party (NSLP), the Nova Scotia New Democratic Party (NDP), The Atlantica Party Association of Nova Scotia (Atlantica Party), The Progressive Conservative Association of Nova Scotia (PC) and one independent candidate. In Glace Bay, five candidates stood for election, one from each of the recognized parties except the GPNS and one independent candidate.

Early voting opportunities commenced on May 25, 2010, the date on which electors could apply to vote by write-in ballot. The special poll was held in each of the returning offices for six of the seven days from June 10 through June 16, 2010. The returning offices were not open to the public on Sundays and therefore, the special polls were not available to the public on Sunday June 13, 2010. Two consecutive days of advance polling on the Friday and Saturday before election day commenced on June 18, 2010.

At the time the writ of election was issued, there were 12,715 electors on the preliminary list of electors for Glace Bay. This number increased to 12,947 electors on the final list of electors<sup>2</sup>. A total of 7,234 (55.87%) electors voted during the Glace Bay by election.

In the electoral district of Yarmouth, at the time the writ of election was issued, there were 12,972 electors on the preliminary list of electors. This number increased to 13,361 electors on the final list of electors. A total of 7,917 (59.25%) electors voted during the Yarmouth by-election.

On June 24, 2010 Geoff MacLellan (NSLP) was declared elected in the electoral district of Glace Bay and Zach Churchill (NSLP) was declared elected in the electoral district of Yarmouth.

Recognized party election expenses for the June 22, 2010 Glace Bay by-election totalled \$9,043.04. Recognized party election expenses for the June 22, 2010 Yarmouth by-election totalled \$15,968.67.

Candidate election expenses in the June 22, 2010 by-elections totalled \$120,782.22 in Glace Bay and \$103,449.10 in Yarmouth.

The final list of electors includes electors added on election day

In the remainder of this report references to Glace Bay and Yarmouth will be made in alphabetical order without using the word "respectively" in each instance



Of the five candidates who stood for election in the Glace Bay by-election, three achieved the required threshold of 10 per cent of valid votes cast in their electional district thus qualifying them for reimbursement of a portion of their election expenses from public funding. Four of the five candidates filed all reports required under the *Elections Act* and the *Members and Public Employees Disclosure Act* (MPEDA). At the time of this publication, total election expenses reimbursements and audit fee reimbursements paid to the official agents of the four candidates was \$57,746.72. This reimbursement may change upon receipt of outstanding reports.

Of the six candidates who stood for election in the Yarmouth by-election, two achieved the required threshold of 10 per cent of the valid votes cast in their electoral district thus qualifying them for reimbursement of a portion of their election expenses from public funding. Five of the six candidates filed all reports required under the *Elections Act* and MPEDA. Total election expenses reimbursements and audit fee reimbursements paid to the official agents of the five candidates was \$40,198.46. This reimbursement may change upon receipt of outstanding reports.

The Glace Bay by-election administration costs, excluding reimbursement of candidate election expenses and audit fees, totalled \$91,067.01. The Yarmouth by-election administration excluding reimbursement of candidate election expenses and audit fees, totalled \$98,815.89. These figures include all direct costs incurred by the electoral district returning offices and indirect costs incurred by Elections Nova Scotia to administer the by-elections. Costs incurred prior to the issuance of the writ of election are not included in the total administration costs for the by-elections. Examples of these costs that are incurred between elections to ensure ongoing election readiness include supplies, materials, computer equipment, software, election officer training, consulting services and other related costs.



#### 2. Electoral Geography

#### 2.1 Electoral Districts

The boundaries for the electoral districts of Glace Bay and Yarmouth were enacted in 2002 under the *House of Assembly Act* on the recommendation of the Nova Scotia Electoral Boundaries Commission. A map displaying the electoral district of Glace Bay and the poll-by-poll results for the Glace Bay by-election is shown in Appendix B. A map displaying the electoral district of Yarmouth and the poll-by-poll results for the Yarmouth by-election is shown in Appendix C.

#### 2.2 Polling Stations

For the by-election held in the electoral district of Glace Bay, there were 46 polling stations. These included 38 election day polls not including mobile polls, one special poll, three advance polling stations at one location, the Bay Plex with the list of electors split alphabetically, three mobile polls to serve four long term care facilities, and one write-in ballot poll (Table 1). Mobile poll one for polling divisions 39 & 41 attended Victoria Haven Nursing Home and Seaview Manor. Mobile poll two for polling division 40 was located at Taigh na Mara. Mobile poll three for polling division 42 was located at Glace Bay Health Care.

For the by-election held in the electoral district of Yarmouth, there were 41 polling stations. These included 36 election day polls not including the mobile poll, one special poll, two advance polling stations at the Yarmouth Fire Hall with the list of electors split alphabetically, one mobile poll to serve polling divisions 34 and 36 two long term care facilities, Villa St. Joseph du Lac and Glow Estates, and one write-in ballot poll (Table 1). Regular polling divisions 22 and 35 were each split into two separate polling stations<sup>4</sup> at the same polling location.

#### 3. Voting Opportunities

#### 3.1 Write-in Ballot

Following the 1998 general election, expressions of interest were raised in the Legislative Assembly about finding possible solutions to the problems associated with proxy voting. Concerns were raised with respect to the complexity of the process, the limitations on elector eligibility and the potential for abuse of votes cast using the proxy system. During the summer of 1998, the Election Commission recommended replacing proxy voting with the current write-in ballot process which ensures the eligibility of an elector through a rigorous application process while at the same time enabling absentee electors and those requiring assistance to complete the voting process from home.

The position of write-in ballot coordinator was first introduced for the June 9, 2009 provincial general election to assist electors who were unable to take advantage of the traditional voting opportunities.

Electors in both by-elections were entitled to vote by write-in ballot. There are three methods by which an elector may apply for a write-in ballot: by mail, by agent or write-in ballot coordinator and in person. Applications for a write-in ballot were available to all electors from the opening of the returning offices on May 25, 2010. The deadline, according to subsection 101(1) of the *Elections Act*, to apply for a write-in ballot are: in-person, day 13 on the election calendar (Appendix A), by mail, day 10, and by agent, day 3. These deadlines are administrative necessities imposed to ensure there is sufficient time for the application process, for the ballots to be completed and returned for counting by the close of polls at 7 pm on election day.

The deadline to vote by write-in ballot in person at the returning office was 8 pm June 9, 2010. After this date, if electors chose to vote in person, they could do so at the special poll, advance poll or on election day. The deadline to apply to vote by write-in ballot with the aid of a write-in ballot coordinator or by agent was 8 pm on day 3, June 19, 2010.

In the Glace Bay by-election, 286 electors voted by write-in ballot, 90 more than in the June 9, 2009 provincial general election. In the Yarmouth by-election, 195 electors voted by write-in ballot, 106 more than in the June 9, 2009 provincial general election.

#### 3.2 Special and Advance Polls

Electors could vote at their returning office special poll from 12 noon to 8 pm each day from June 10 through June 16 except for Sunday June 13, when both returning offices were closed to the public. Three advance polling stations were conducted at the Bay Plex in Glace Bay and two advance poll stations were conducted in the Yarmouth Fire Hall in Yarmouth from 10 am to 8 pm on June 18 and 19. A total of 377 more electors in Glace Bay and 390 more electors in Yarmouth voted at the special and advance polls than in the June 9, 2009 provincial general election.

#### 3.3 Ordinary Polls

June 22, 2010 was election day for both by-elections. Polls were open from 8 am to 7 pm. There were 38 polls at 9 polling locations in Glace Bay and 36 polls at 34 polling locations in Yarmouth. Mobile polls served the long term care facilities in four hour increments in both districts on election day.

#### 4. Elector Participation

#### 4.1 Elector Registration

When the by-elections were called there were 12,715 electors on the preliminary list of electors for Glace Bay and 12,972 for Yarmouth. During the target revision process, electors were added to and removed from the preliminary list of electors for each electoral district. At the conclusion of revision on day 6 of the election calendar (Appendix A), the returning officers certified their official lists of electors with 12,672 electors in Glace Bay and 13,098 electors in Yarmouth. After election day, the final list of electors for Glace Bay contained 12,947 electors and for Yarmouth, 13,361 electors. Both final lists include electors added at the polls on election day.

#### 4.2 Improving Accessibility through the Write-in Ballot Process

Electors had numerous opportunities to vote in person during the by-elections: by write-in ballot at the returning offices, at the special polls in the returning offices, at the advance polls, and on election day. Despite this, a segment of the eligible voting public was less likely to exercise their right to vote because they could not physically get to one of these polls. The current *Elections Act* recognizes these limitations for a part of this group. Section 91A permits the use of mobile polls in long term care facilities with 10 or more residents. Mobile polls were set up in both electoral districts to assist these electors. Of the 335 electors eligible to vote in the six<sup>5</sup> designated facilities in Glace Bay and Yarmouth, 142 voted. There are many more electors with the same or similar

mobility issues – electors who live on their own, in nursing homes, assisted fiving facilities or in other private residences – who are not eligible under the current rules to have a mobile poll in their place of residence. For these electors, the best option available to vote under the act is the write-in ballot process.

During the 2009 general election, Elections Nova Scotia promoted the write-in ballot process by conducting a province-wide outreach program with advertising aimed at encouraging citizens to assist their relatives, close friends and neighbours to vote using the write-in ballot process. This program was complemented with the creation of the write-in ballot coordinator position in each electoral district. The write-in ballot coordinator assisted electors with completing application forms, copying identification documents or locating potential agents from local service clubs or other groups in close proximity to act on behalf of the elector. Due largely to this program, the percentage of electors who voted by write-in ballot increased from 2,980 in the 2006 general election to 5,143 in the 2009 general election (see Table 2), an increase of 73 per cent.

In the four by-elections since the 2009 general election, returning officers were encouraged to continue to use the write-in ballot coordinator to improve the service to shut-ins and electors in residences not served by mobile polls. Consequently, the number of electors who voted by write-in ballot in the 2009 and 2010 by-elections grew in all cases by an average of 61 per cent over their 2009 general election totals.

Both returning officers in Antigonish and Inverness used the write-in ballot coordinator position in the 2009 general election and their 2009 by-elections. Antigonish saw an increase of 10 (15%) voters and Inverness, an increase of 48 (74%) voters using the write-in ballot process compared to the general election earlier the same year.

While neither the returning officer in Yarmouth nor Glace Bay chose to use the write-in ballot coordinator position in the 2009 general election, both did use the position in the 2010 by-elections. Glace Bay saw an increase of 90 (46%) voters and Yarmouth saw an increase of 106 (119%) voters using the write-in ballot process compared to the general election a year earlier.



#### 5. By-election Results

#### 5.1 Glace Bay

On June 30, 2010 the returning officer for Glace Bay completed the return of the writ declaring Geoff MacLellan (NSLP) elected and transmitted it to the Chief Electoral Officer. A summary of valid votes received by each candidate is shown in Table 3. The poll-by-poll results for Glace Bay are shown in Appendix B.

#### 5.2 Yarmouth

On June 30, 2010, the returning officer for Yarmouth completed the return of the writ declaring Zach Churchill (NSLP) elected and transmitted it to the Chief Electoral Officer. A summary of valid votes received by each candidate is shown in Table 4. The poll-by-poll results for Yarmouth are shown in Appendix C.

#### 5.3 Distribution of Seats in the House of Assembly following By-elections

At the conclusion of the by-elections the distribution of seats in the Nova Scotia House of Assembly was: 31 Nova Scotia New Democratic Party; 13 Nova Scotia Liberal Party; 7 The Progressive Conservative Association of Nova Scotia and 1 independent member.

#### 6. Recognized Parties

Pursuant to subsections 184(1) and 191(7) of the *Elections Act*, the official agent of each recognized party is required to file an audited report of election expenses, Form 603, Report of Recognized Party's Election Expenses, with the Chief Electoral Officer within 120 days after the day fixed for the return of the writs of election. For the electoral districts of Glace Bay and Yarmouth the recognized parties were required to file a report of election expenses on or before October 30, 2010.

The maximum amount that a recognized party could incur for election expenses in each of the electoral districts of Glace Bay and Yarmouth, as prescribed by subsection 181(2) of the *Elections Act* was \$5,687.40.

Each of the four recognized parties that endorsed a candidate in the Glace Bay by-election filed an audited report of election expenses with the Chief Electoral Officer, three within the prescribed time frame. Each of the five recognized parties that endorsed a candidate in the Yarmouth by-election filed an audited report of election expenses with the Chief Electoral Officer. Four of those parties filed this report within the prescribed time frame. There are no financial consequences for late filing or failure to file statutory reports specified in the *Elections Act* or MPEDA. Failure to comply with section 184 of the *Elections Act* does however, require the Chief Electoral Officer to commence the deregistration process of a recognized party. Recognized party election expenses, as filed, are shown in Table 5 for the electoral district of Glace Bay and in Table 6 for the electoral district of Yarmouth.

#### 7. Candidates

At the time of the by-elections, there were five recognized parties in Nova Scotia. At the close of nominations on June 8, 2010 at 2 pm, all five recognized parties had endorsed candidates in Yarmouth and four had endorsed candidates in Glace Bay, as shown in Table 7. One independent candidate stood for election in each of the by-elections.

#### 7.1 Appointment and Responsibilities of the Official Agent

Subsection 178(1) of the *Elections Act* requires each candidate to appoint an official agent and provide the name and address of their official agent in their nomination paper. The official agent of a candidate is responsible for all financial aspects of the campaign and is required to file reports with the Chief Electoral Officer detailing election expenses, political contributions and tax receipts. Certain reports must include an opinion provided by the auditor appointed by the candidate. Table 8 provides a listing of reports that must be filed by the official agent of a candidate including the legislative reference, the audit requirement and the filing deadline.

Table 9 lists each candidate and their official agent as well as the date on which the official agent initially filed reports relating to the election with the Chief Electoral Officer. With the exception of the report of disposal of excess contributions, all reports were due on or before August 31, 2010 for both by-elections. There are no financial consequences for late filing or failure to file statutory reports specified in the *Elections Act* or MPEDA. However, a candidate who is elected is disqualified from sitting or voting in the House of Assembly under Section 185 of the *Elections Act* until required reports are filed.

#### 7.2 Candidate Election Expenses Spending Limits

Subsections 181(3) and (5) of the *Elections Act* provide the formula for calculating the maximum amount that a candidate may incur for election expenses as defined in clause 3(i) of the *Elections Act*. Table 10 shows the calculation of the maximum amount a candidate could have incurred for election expenses in the electoral districts of Glace Bay and Yarmouth.

#### 7.3 Candidate Reimbursements

At the time a candidate files their nomination paper with the returning officer, he or she is required to provide a deposit of \$100. If the candidate receives not less than 10 per cent of the valid votes cast in their electoral district, the nomination deposit is returned to the candidate's official agent. Of the 11 candidates who stood for election in the two by-elections, five had their nomination deposit returned. Refer to Appendixes B and C for the percentage of the valid votes cast for candidates in both by-elections.

A candidate who receives not less than 10 per cent of the valid votes cast in their electoral district is eligible to receive reimbursement of election expenses. The amount of reimbursement is the lesser of the maximum reimbursement amount (\$1.42 per elector), as prescribed in subsections 182(1) and (4) of the *Elections Act*, or the candidate's actual election expenses. The maximum amount of reimbursement a candidate could receive is shown in Table 11.

The three-part election expenses report filed by the official agent of a candidate receives a detailed compliance review by the Chief Electoral Officer and her financial staff. All expenses reported must meet the definition of election expenses in subsection 3(i) of the *Elections Act*. Subsection 180(1) of the *Elections Act* requires that any payment of \$25 or more for election expenses must be evidenced by a receipt. Appendix D, Table D-1 shows each candidate's expenses as categorized in the report of election expenses (Form 601 Part II and Part III) as amended by ENS following the detailed compliance review. Election expenses as originally filed, as amended (if necessary) following the detailed compliance review and the total election expenses and audit fee reimbursements that were made to the official agent are shown in Appendix D, Table D-2.

#### 8. Returning Offices

For the June 22, 2010 by-elections returning offices were established in both electoral districts. Permanent locations for returning offices are not maintained. Each returning officer identifies potential returning office locations when directed to do so by the Chief Electoral Officer and leases are executed following the issuance of the writ of election.

#### 8.1 Returning Office Costs

Elections Nova Scotia records and reports all costs associated with the delivery of a by-election. Costs associated with election service delivery that can be specifically identified with a returning office or have been allocated based on the number of electors by electoral district are categorized as direct costs. For reporting purposes costs are consolidated into various categories. Table 12 shows these categories and the type of expenditure that is consolidated within each category.

Indirect costs are overhead costs associated with election administration and election operations that are incurred by Elections Nova Scotia as part of election service delivery. These costs are prorated based on the final list of electors and allocated to each electoral district returning office. Table 13 shows the types of expenditures which are reported as ENS Overhead in Appendix D, Table D-3.

#### 9. Cost per Elector

Cost per Elector is a calculation that allows comparison and evaluation of each electoral event's total election costs to the total costs of previous general elections and by-elections. Total election costs include three components:

- Candidate election expenses reimbursements;
- Candidate audit fee reimbursement;
- Returning office costs.

Table 14 provides a summary of election costs and Cost per Elector for the June 22, 2010 by-elections in the electoral districts of Glace Bay and Yarmouth.






